So I went to the Rainbow Grange meeting recently, after hearing about it for over a year now. My goal is to spotlight a different meeting every issue. So off to Rainbow I went. I was curious as to what the "Grange" stood for. What was that building and why was it called "Rainbow Valley Grange 689"? The folks I asked on site weren't sure, but thought it was related to farming. Thanks to Google, now I know what The Grange is.

The mission statement of CA State Grange is: Since 1873 the mission of the California State Grange has been to serve, steward and teach the virtues of the land to our children and community. We maintain our commitment to grassroots advocacy, supporting farmland preservation, farm development, community service, sustainable and regenerative agriculture, and the consumer's role in the food production system.

It's nice to know so many different entities are willing to host AA meetings, not just churches and umbrella groups.

The Grange has been hosting meetings for over 50 years, being one of the oldest meetings in our region.

I spoke with their secretary Dave, and he informed me that AA had gotten sent their walking papers from that venue back around 2013, and he worked hard to get them back there. In 2019 AA was allowed back to the Grange, just in time for COVID.

The Grange Hall is located at 2160 Rainbow Valley Blvd. Fallbrook (Rainbow), CA.

"Dave said, "During lockdown we still had meetings. We would meet out back in the grassy area, wearing our masks." In the summertime, that's also where they meet, now without the masks. I can verify that the Grange is located in a pleasantly remote setting in Rainbow. The back lawn is idyllic. Perfect for an outdoor book study.

BOX 4-5-9

Box 459 is the quarterly news bulletin of our General Service Office (GSO) in New York. When AA was first established, Box 459 was their PO box address. In the late 1930s, a small office in Newark, N.J., staffed by co-founder Bill W. and a secretary, was enough to maintain contact among the first 100 A.A. members. Soon, the rapidly spreading Fellowship needed a real world service office, and "headquarters" was shifted to New York City, with a series of moves as membership grew into the hundreds of thousands. From 1970 to 1992 GSO was located at 468 Park Avenue South. In 1992, GSO moved to 475 Riverside Drive, where both A.A. World Services and Grapevine personnel are housed.

THOSE OTHER PEOPLE "I AM NO BETTER OR WORSE" by Rick R.

My life before alcoholic drinking was nothing to write home about. With very little supervision I did just about anything I wanted to do, and the things I wanted to do were nothing to be proud of. I was always looking over my shoulder, hoping not to get caught, and lying and cheating became a way of life for me. I violated the trust of anybody that seemed to care about me. I laid awake nights with my head spinning trying to come up with answers to questions that I expected people to ask me, and I wanted to have alibis to cover up my arrant behavior, and I knew that they weren't buying it. From the time I was eight years old, I can never remember a single night that I slept as a normal person sleeps. My brain was always spinning. Somewhere around the age of thirteen was the first time that I set out to get drunk and for the first time in years I experienced sound sleep. The effect that the alcohol had on me, aside from the throwing up, was incredible and from that day on I drank every chance I could, and the sleep issue was temporarily resolved except for those nights when I couldn't get anything to drink. That went on for the next fifteen years until the progression of alcoholism went through its course and I had lost more than I was willing to lose. I could no longer lie to myself that things were going to get better. I ran out of options, and I came to Alcoholics Anonymous, at the young age of twenty-eight, (Oct. 15, 1969) desperate and defeated, and believe it or not, have not wanted a drink since that very first day. Initially, that didn't stop my brain from spinning, but I immediately saw the possibilities of working through the steps of the program on most of the damage I had caused. I was debating every issue, and I swear I could take either side of an argument and

give you indisputable information on the subject. My Ego had me in competition with everyone. I needed to be right. I found that I was no better or worse than anyone else, and that started me on my way. On page 268 in As Bill Sees It, is the topic "Those Other People "and I realized that I was causing my own problems, even when I was pointing out the faults of others. I had to lay down my arms and give everyone amnesty without exception. We all have problems, and I cannot be selective about who I do or do not accept or forgive. I am nobody's victim nor anybody's perpetrator. I had to quit keeping score; it's not a competition anymore. In cases where a person crosses my boundaries and I see no way of rectifying the problem, I can quietly withdraw from that situation without being critical of that other person. I also concluded that I am not a mind reader (imagine that) and that nothing good can come from a mixture of my faulty thinking and their faulty thinking. I need only to be understanding and caring. It is not necessary that they reciprocate. I am no longer threatened by what other people think or say about me. That's in the hands of something much greater than me. The People that "know me well", know me well, and that's more than enough for me. I could go on and on with these examples of how I've addressed each one of my past problems with my thinking when it involves others who have problems as well as I have. I will accept any idea that is consistent with acceptance and forgiveness, and as a result, my head no longer spins. I can truly say that I experience peace of mind and a quiet heart almost without limits and, as always, I wish the same for Those Other People

Step Six Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

Having done the 4th and 5th steps I did discover that I was actually my own worst enemy. I was ready to have those bad things removed that were causing me so many problems and was ready to do this simple sounding sixth step. My sponsor gave me a list of character defects and I think I was in shock. I couldn't possibly have all those. Yet, as I went through the list to check off those that belonged to me, I recognized that if I answered yes or no to each one, there may not be any nos. She reassured me that I may not have all of them or not all to the same degree. So, armed with a certain amount of comfort, I went through the list and I was able to admit to having nearly all of those defects.

To be honest though, I have to say that many of those defects in my character I admitted to, I thought were only very slight defects. Then in A.A.'s book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p.68, I read "it seems plain that few of us can quickly or easily become ready to aim at spiritual and moral perfection; we want to settle for only as much perfection as will get us by in life...So the difference between "the boys and the men" (or "the girls and the women") is the difference between striving for a selfdetermined objective and for the perfect objective which is of God."

It seemed that I might be settling for only as much as will get me by. I knew that for my sobriety, that was not enough. But in rereading I did find a solution from The 12 and 12 p.65, "Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character "- is A.A.'s way of stating the best possible attitude one can take in order to make a beginning on this lifetime job." The keys are my attitude and to remember that this is a lifelong process. Often I am finding that with character defects as with other things, 'more will be revealed'. Being willing and having made a beginning, I go forward 'one day at a time'.

WHAT IS CENTRAL OFFICE?

What is Central Office?

A Central Office (or Intergroup) is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community—just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. A central office is established to carry out certain functions common to all the groups—functions which are best handled by a centralized office —and it is usually maintained, supervised, and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers.
