Well, since I was the only one in earshot, and I was looking for a commitment, I told him I would do it. This commitment has been rewarding. It helps keep me sober. It keeps me coming to the meeting each week. It keeps me accountable to others who rely on someone to unlock the door and set the room up each week. It give me a feeling of purpose in A.A. I'm not saying all this to toot my own horn, I'm trying to let the reader know that commitments of service are important. It's how we give back what was freely given to us. I was told that it's important that we have the "spirit of rotation" in regards to service commitments. We alcoholics need opportunities to serve, so time limits are crucial to give people that opportunity.

I've heard from more than one person that this Sunday morning meeting is "their church". A way for them to keep growing spiritually, and I feel the same way. SPIRITUAL SIMPLICITY GETS IT DONE Practice the Program with Enthusiasm

Tackling the alcoholism problem, the wreckage of the past, and trying to be Spiritual at the same time is a large order in the beginning. Most of us are consumed with the trauma left in the wake of a life run by our Egos and flooded with alcohol. We hear a variety of ways to approach the Spiritual way of life and we try to fit it into our A.A. agenda but, still reeling from the wreckage, our effort seemed scattered at best.

If we manage to get a handle on those troubling issues that consume our thinking, it often frees us up to explore the Spiritual aspects of the program at a deeper level. At first, it is not easy to define, or to articulate, the word spiritual but most of us will try to put a face on it based on something we learned in church or something we have heard at an A.A. meeting etc. This is an O.K. start but it is wise to continue to look for that deeper meaning that is consistent with the spirit of the A.A. program and to practice it in our daily lives. As I research the word spiritual, I find many phrases that could define it such as: In the spirit of, Of the inside, Intangible, not of a physical or material nature, Religious, Psychic, and many more.

I have read most of the publications that have come from the list of A.A. approved literature, and in "Doctor Bob and the Good Old Timers", it suggests that when the Co-founders had to address the issue of spirituality, they got their inspiration from the book: The Sermon on the Mount, by Emmet Fox. (1938) I have found that book to be exactly what I needed to segue into a way of thinking that covers all the principles that A.A. suggests. It explains that we can live by the Letter of the Law, and still not receive the desired results until we learn to live in the Spirit of the Law. This is my Go-to Guide and I frequently reread it to reinforce my Spiritual understanding. I do not go-it alone. There I come to understand that there's no such thing as a Selfish Spiritual Principle. We hear talk of prayer and most of us who have been around awhile have found an approach that works for us. If I pray to God, how does God communicate his message to me? I have never heard a voice that I could confirm to be the voice of God. I do, however, receive inspiration in the form that is more than enough for me, and I have a tremendous amount of faith. They speak of a kind and loving God is he may express himself in our group conscience. That works for me.

The way I have come to explain this concept is as follows: I have sat in on thousands of A.A. meetings and whether I know it or not, my mind is collecting information that I am not even aware of, and storing it away, as in a file cabinet, in those 10 billion brain cells that we are supposed to have in our heads. When I pray for guidance, the search begins in the file system and comes up with the answer intuitively. This file cabinet metaphor is my way of trying to express a sound and solid approach to being open to outside influences without really having to define who or what God is. He speaks in many ways.

Another thing that I believe it does without my personal effort is to Neutralize much of my negative way of thinking. Spirituality is an inside quality. It resides in my mind, my heart, and my conscience. To acquire it I had only to stop fighting and practice the rest of the A.A. program as enthusiastically as I could (12&12 page 27) and I might add, Keep it Simple.

INTO ACTION Thoughts on Step 9

"Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."

As an alcoholic, I have well-developed skills of rationalization and procrastination. I honed those skills over decades of drinking. Self-serving rationalization is the number two tool to an active alcoholic drinker. Right behind number one, self-centered fear.

Since both those defects of character still live within me to a degree (far less than before, thank God), it's easy to pull them out of my tool box and avoid making amends. It's easy to say: "Well, wouldn't it be injurious to that person if they got really, really upset at me?" or "What if they don't forgive me, or worse, spread the details of my misdeeds all around town?" Fear and rationalization can conspire to interfere with the willingness I prayed for in Step Eight.

So prudence, patience and good timing are paramount when making these direct amends. The advice of a sponsor or other fellows in AA as well as advice from the Big Book are essential with regard to doing Step Nine. I had to remember, this Step talks about not injuring them or others, so I have to get over my fear of it injuring me. I had to be willing to accept the reaction of the person I have forgiven, and I have to forgive myself. After all, self-forgiveness may be the only forgiveness I get! Because this Step isn't about being forgiven, it's about owning up to my part in the mess I have made. I can always ask the person what they need to make things right.

I would compare the freedom of the wreckage, shame and guilt to the freedom from the obsession to drink. It's that profound. Conquering my fear and actually doing the hard amends was probably the biggest accomplishment in my sobriety. And because I never have to drink again, I never have to do that same amends again.

CLANCY I. & DICK V. Pacific Group Legends

Clancy I. hanging with Dick V! For those who don't know, Clancy was an AA speaker who reached legendary status. His participation in the Pacific group and thousands of his sponsees changed how AA operated on the West Coast, across our nation, and around the world. Clancy sponsored like a hammer, always striving to form his sponsees into better humans. He was often very successful in helping transform hopeless humans, bringing them from unhoused and unemployable to great professional heights. Many of his sponsees became doctors, lawyers, nurses, and business owners. He passed in 2022 from COVID after running faceto-face meetings during the lockdown. His fearlessness is an inspiration for all of us.

Dick V. is a proud member of Alcoholics Anonymous, an actor, entertainer, and comedian. He starred in the movie The Morning After in 1972 which depicted the horrors of alcoholism. He rallied others to go to Wahington D.C. to present a new plan to our nation on how to treat those suffering from alcoholism. Crying out that addicts and alcoholics need to be treated for a disease with love and compassion. He still speaks out today and countless articles, soundbites, and interviews can be found with a quick web search "Dick V. Alcoholism". Try it for yourself.

These two men demonstrate that anonymity is optional. The 12 steps and 12 traditions say that if we read between the lines we can see that anonymity in AA was mostly out of fear. Personally, I see the value of humility in anonymity, but for those of us in low positions in life can be raised up by stating our sobriety. When speaking to debt collectors I used a line from the book. "I have been slow to pay because of my drinking." This resulted in praise from the other end of the phone a few times. It can be challenging to hold on to humility when praised by others. It appears Clancy was able to hold space for enough humility to continue working with others and spreading the message of hope that AA offers. Dick V. continues to make an impact today with his continued sobriety.

THIS MONTH IN A.A. HISTORY

Reprinted from Westside Central Office, Sept 2022

• September 1939 – A score or more of alcoholics apply the A.A. program and recover in Cleveland, Ohio. This sudden growth of A.A. in Cleveland proves that A.A. can grow to a great size. Also around this time, the Cleveland Plain Dealer newspaper would run a series of articles on A.A.

• September 30, 1939 - An article on A.A. titled Alcoholics and God appears in Liberty magazine. After publication of this article, Big Book sales saw an increase of several hundred and the early A.A. Newark Office received 800 pleas for help.

• September 1947 – The first A.A. group in Brazil takes shape.

• September 1947 – A.A. is started in the Eugene-Springfield Oregon area when eight members met at the YMCA on September 12, 1947.

• September 9, 1948 – The Astoria Alano Club opens its doors for the first time at 145 11th Street in Astoria, Oregon. The first group in Astoria, known as the Central Group, would meet at the Alano Club on Wednesdays and Saturdays at 8pm.

• September 1950 – The first meeting in Seaside, Oregon is held at the home of Earl E. and his nonalcoholic wife Leona.

• September 1951 – The first Oregon A.A. Newsletter, titled "Our Baby", begins publication. The monthly newsletter would carry state as well as national A.A. news. Each group would receive a copy in the mail and additional copies were circulated through the central office in Portland. 500-600 copies were printed for each issue. The newsletter would cease publication after three years. The Oregon Area would begin publishing a second newsletter in April, 1960.

• September 2001 – In the wake of the September 11, 2001 attack on the World Trade Center in New York, exhausted A.A. members among firefighters, police, and clean-up crews formed A.A. meetings at Ground Zero.



WHAT IS CENTRAL OFFICE?

What is Central Office?

A Central Office (or Intergroup) is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community—just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. A central office is established to carry out certain functions common to all the groups—functions which are best handled by a centralized office —and it is usually maintained, supervised, and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers.


