A heavy fog clouded my scattered, troubled thoughts during the wee hours of December 3, 2010. Relegated to a messy, disorganized, home office in my otherwise big, beautiful, well-kept abode, in my drunken mind, I was safely isolated amid strewn papers, unopened mail and boxes filled to the brim with legal files.

True, I had every intention of sifting through the insurmountable mess. Yes! That pile of personal business, over there in the corner, taunting and reminding me that my life had become utterly unmanageable. I'll get to all of 'it' after one more sip of tequila through the long straw placed in the bottle. Who needs a tumbler? Who needs a shot glass? The coffee will even out the morning buzz, right?

Sip of Cuervo, sip of coffee; Cuervo, coffee; Cuervo, coffee, and so it went. I'd awaken on the floor of my walk-in closet facing a painfully blank wall. I suppose I expected supernaturally written directions or a vision of some sort, instilling a sense of divine purpose, like in the movies.

Where's the burning bush? Where's the Calvary? Where are you, God?

My rationale for drinking in the early morning was that the initial euphoria helped me to address some agonizing business – life on life's terms. The rigorous truth is I was drinking all day, every day, but I didn't care. Of course, over the last six months of 2010, my mom had died, my elderly dad needed tending to and I was losing my lovely home to divorce. During 2009-2010, I was hospitalized, twice, for emergency appendectomies. Did you know an appendix stump can grow back? Neither did I and I'm an RN.

My young son was jostled between both his dad's new home and mine, adding to his seemingly infinite, out-of-town sport gigs assigned by his relentless dad. After my mom died in June, I didn't return to work as a contract healthcare provider because I couldn't stop crying long enough to do my job. I sorely wanted to go to work but I couldn't get there, either physically or emotionally, no matter how hard I tried. I declined contracts, perhaps erring on the safe side of doing nothing rather than showing up and carelessly conducting myself at the expense of another. Then apathy settled in, permeating my scant endeavors that were once so numerous, grandiose and accomplished.

When I drank...whatever, the alcohol immediately doused my scorching panic and lightened my heavy heart. By the time I arrived at Unity Hall, my eyes were black and blue from rubbing them so hard from crying during my frequent, fervent prayer sessions with God. Every evening, I'd jog for a couple of hours, trying to conjure up the solution for eradicating my dogged uncertainty, financial insecurity, deep humiliation, wretched contempt and inexplicable helplessness. I lost my appetite. I lost a lot of weight on my tall frame. I sported a red, blotchy, dour face that was once quite beautiful. Both my heart and my soul were shackled with hopelessness. By order of King Alcohol, I was pummeled and thrown into a bleak, spiritual dungeon with no chance of escape.

Finally, finally I mustered enough resolve to get dressed in my best sweat suit to attend a Friday, noon meeting, via a tell-tale, unmistakable, spiritual experience. I heard His still small voice lovingly say, "Stop everything. Begin with the last thing, first." I had been staring the straw leaning against the rim of a half-full bottle of the golden tequila. Through the liquid, I could see the merciful eyes of a framed image of Christ (my Higher Power) sitting on my desk. I intuitively knew I needed help with the drinking. My binges had gotten out of hand. I appeared at Unity Hall, bleary-eyed, resting my weary head on my folded arms on the table in front of me. I was inebriated and forlorn, still. I couldn't take another step. I surrender!

My name is Irene and I'm an alcoholic. Welcome to the noon meeting at Unity Hall. I've asked a friend to read the AA Preamble...

Scripts? They're reading scripts? I need a script, yesterday.

I've asked a friend to read a portion of Chapter five, 'How It Works.'

My name's Bob and I'm an alcoholic. Rarely have we seen a person fail who has thoroughly followed our path...One: We admitted we were powerless over alcohol and that our lives had become unmanageable.

How'd they know? Who told them?

God will do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

Really? I've been asking Him for a long while. I give up. What are they talking about? I have no idea what they're talking about. I don't care. Leave me alone. I'm drooling. I need to rest my head in the other direction.

Can I get you some coffee, Lyn? Water? You're welcome.

They're so nice. Is there a test after the meeting? I can't remember what they just said. Sharing experience, strength and hope: She drank in the morning, too? Wow. What's a court card? What's a Big Book?

Here's my number. Keep coming back.

What's this about? I desperately need and want help. I heard AA is the place to get it. I stopped crying AND drinking after my first meeting, December 3, 2010. The chest pain from my heavy heart disappeared, right off the bat. My dad died in 2012. I've moved into another home in a different city up the road, apiece. I've entirely new, professional endeavors I've only dreamed of in my intrepid youth. The deep mire of the indescribably visceral, immobilizing pain and gyrating confusion vanished. Poof! Just like that.

One day at a time? The next indicated step? Keep coming back? The Promises? A Vision For You? I can't wait to get to meetings, primarily because I believe the fellowship understands me. Though I blather on at times, they patiently listen and kindly proffer suggestions on occasion. They allow me to be of service with commitments I can manage, granting me a huge sense of purpose that had mysteriously disappeared. Did I mention I stopped drooling? I'm looking up, these days. I no longer feel completely lost. I trust God as he miraculously helps me sift through the wreckage of my past in His time, with the help of the AA fellowship. I can attest to God's perfect intervention and planning.




Featured Article Continued

I've never been arrested for a DUI, nor have I been disciplined via the workplace, though my sponsor suggested I place an attendance card in the basket. The pretty, flowery note card is a subtle reminder of all of the drunken times I came out unscathed. I framed the first card along with a newcomer's chip. I love placing the card in the basket as it marks time and my sober achievement, much like the prized birthday chips. When I forget to retrieve it after the meeting, a member of the fellowship either hands it to me or pins it to the hall's bulletin board. The gesture of tending to my silly card is one of the priceless gifts of the AA fellowship.

Thankfully, my licensures remain professionally fit because I recognized the insidious, destructive, beckoning chemical alternatives rising up to greet me in my selfish state. Two years, nine months later, seeking help in AA has been the best personal decision I've made in my entire life. In working the steps with my trusted sponsor, it turns out my drinking career is longstanding. No kidding, I never knew. I happily and easily sift through the resources, the meetings here and there, commitments, speaking, sharing and being of service.

The AA program transcends every aspect of my life. I wallow in easy, breezy, butterfly thoughts, generosity, healing, wisdom, fun, laughter (read: miracles) and friendships that I never imagined possible. I turned my will and my life over to the care of God as I understand Him. The beauty of sobriety is that the fog has lifted. I recognize God has understood and cared for me, all along, as evidenced by the peace and mercy washing over me every time I take a seat in AA – the perpetual beacon of hope. *My name's Lyn and I'm an alcoholic. Keep coming back.*



"12. Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to other alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."


How It Works
