Friends of Dr. Bob and Bill W. Meeting Notes Aboard the Sapphire Princess Twenty-eight day Polynesia Cruise

We began the meetings with the AA preamble, the

serenity prayer and the declaration of responsibility. Leadership was rotated amongst us, each leader nominating a topic. We had twenty one members with a total of 570 years of sobriety. Five of them had less than 20 years, ten had more than 30 years and two had 40+ years. We had a core group of 11-14 sharing routinely. So take a moment of silence, recite the serenity prayer to yourself then join me as I relate memorable shares from our on-board meetings.

If you don't think you've got a serious disease stick around and bury a few. Don't go out and buy a cap and gown, you don't graduate from this program. The beatings will continue until your attitude improves. AA is not a popularity contest. We will hurt your feelings. I don't care if you like me or not – I care if you stay sober. You've got to tell the truth. Drinking alcohol is not an option. The three essential prayers are: "Help, Thanks, Wow." Stop self-mutilation. How small my world was when I was drinking. I lost that right to drink. I cannot drink alcohol. As a new-comer to AA you are in kindergarten. We'll help you grow up.

What I got from AA is my self-love, my love of others, my life of happy, joyous freedom, my toughness and my gratitude. I have a debt that will never be repaid. I have a new freedom in many ways. While I feel out of place with drinking I can get along with people on the outside, those non-AA folks. I feel good enough about myself that I can be around 'normies'. I found a home, a place where I fit. I stick with winners and hang around people who fit well in their own skin. I have a disease. If I put alcohol in my body I am 'cooked', I am done, I am finished. I have murdered my better self. I am a human being first. I have a disease and I am doing something to manage it. AA taught me

how to spread my wings, expand my world. I hang out with people who make me feel---better. I stay away from 'slippery bananas'. I get so excited being sober. I love to play. I want to play – I don't want to hurt anybody. I can do that now. I am happy about not having to pick up a drink. I can go anywhere in the world. I am aware of my character defects. I can laugh at myself. I've abandoned the God of my misunderstanding.

I've never met anyone who got down on their knees in the morning, asked God to keep them sober for the day, then went out and got drunk. The will of God will never lead you where the grace of God will not keep you safe. Trust the process. Watch others that are

successful and do what they do. Don't drink, go to meetings, read the book, do the steps. Too many do not hear the last two suggestions then go out and die. You do the deal and you get the results. Stick with the winners and watch the losers. Then question the losers. They'll show you what not to do. I looked for peace through the bottle. I wanted a new reality. From my stark raving fear that I couldn't stay sober I developed willingness.

A *Personal Experience With Tradition Three*

TRADITION THREE

The only requirement for A.A. membership is a DESIRE to stop drinking.

Tradition Three is a tradition of acceptance: acceptance of drunks of any kind. Because of Tradition Three, Alcoholics Anonymous does not turn away scorned women, bank robbers, unfit parents, murderers, liars, cheats, thieves and the like. Tradition Three simply states you are a member of Alcoholics Anonymous if you say you are. Members do not even have to say, "I am an alcoholic." The ONLY REQUIREMENT for membership is a DESIRE to stop drinking. Getting sober is not a requirement.

Alcoholics Anonymous is a program that offers suggestions on how to proceed. Although the Big Book has many "MUSTS," the program can be worked in any manner you wish. The journey through the Steps to a Spiritual Awakening is a personal one. The causes and conditions of my past were revealed when they were supposed to be revealed. My lessons show up again and

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again and again until I learn from them. What if it was required to grow out of a behavior the minute I stopped drinking? Alcoholics are stubborn and if I had been told there were rules or requirements, I know this alcoholic may not be sober today. Don't tell me what to do!!!!

My experience with Tradition Three has been profound. I got to A.A. thinking I was an addict. I have the mind set of "more is better." In AA I have found recovery from my many afflictions. I have formed a relationship with God that has evolved over the years from being "God, really?" to "God is everything." In Bill's story it says, "When they talked of God I became irritated and my mind slammed shut." What if Bill had been told believing in God was a prerequisite of recovery? Would A.A. be the program it is today?

This tradition talks about Ed. Ed was atheist. Ed was one of those members who when he shared, other members held their breath or went outside to smoke or took a nap. Ed made everyone aware of his dislike of the "God stuff." Ed stayed sober for a while despite his attitude toward God. Somehow, Ed was brought to his knees and God was revealed to him. Ed had the DE-SIRE to stop drinking.

How then do we deal with newcomers and even old timers with dual addictions? Do we allow them to share of their other addiction as it relates to their alcoholism? In Chapter 2 "There is a Solution," it describes the "REAL ALCOHOLIC" (page 22). "As matters grow worse, he begins to use a combination of high a powered sedative and liquor to quiet his nerves. Then comes the day he simply cannot make it and gets drunk all over again. Perhaps he goes to a doctor who gives him morphine or some sedative with which to taper off his addictions." We each have a different story that brought us to the doors of the program – we are unique until we arrive.

Tradition Three is all about Acceptance.

BRIDGING THE GAP

Bridging the Gap is designed to help an alcoholic between a treatment program or prison make the transition. One of the more slippery places in the journey to sobriety is between the door of a facility and the nearest AA group or meeting. AA experience suggests that attending meetings regularly is critical. In order to Bridge the Gap, AA members have volunteered to be temporary contacts & introduce newcomers to AA. It is suggested that the temporary contact take the newcomer to a variety of AA meetings; introduce him or her to other AA's; insure that he or she has some phone numbers of several AA members and share the experience of sponsorship and a home group.

Temecula Valley is in the process of coordinating this committee. Volunteers are needed.

What you get from Central Office!

During the day, your Central Office keeps the doors open to assist recovering and suffering AA members alike and provide the following services: We provide the Big Book.

We provide the 12x12, assorted literature, chips, and newcomer packets.

Your office manager organizes volunteers, makes sure the office is a healthy place for all, keeps your accounting data accurate, and safe guards your inventory. The office manager is there to support the groups and the individual members of our fellowship.

We make and distribute your meeting schedules and we publish the Gratitude Gazette. Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, volunteers take calls from suffering alcoholics and organize 12 step calls. The phone line and special call-forwarding are paid for by your central office contributions.

Please ask at your next business meeting if you are contributing monthly to your Central Office. It doesn't have to be a lot. Being selfsupporting means not only paying for your rent and coffee, but also paying for the services you receive through Central Office. If your group has stopped contributing (or never started), please bring it up at your next business meeting and take a group conscious. Let us know when and how we can help.



We were now at *Step Three*. Many of us said to our Maker, *as we understood Him*: "God, I offer myself to Thee-to build with me and to do with me as Thou wilt. Relieve me of the bondage of self, that I may better do Thy will. Take away my difficulties, that victory over them may bear witness to those I would help of Thy Power, Thy Love, and Thy Way of life. 




