Whenever anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there, and for that I am responsible.

DEEP DOWN INSIDE

When we talk about a" power greater than ourselves", we all have a different way of expressing the way we, as individuals, try to describe our understanding of it. We hear a person say "deep down in my heart, I knew better" and if we take that sentence literally we could ask," how can an organ that pumps blood to everything in our body, know better"? It is obviously a figure of speech meaning something else. Or" What is a soul"?" What shape does a soul take"? That's another thing a person could have a problem defining. Then there's, "What is a conscience"? It seems to be something inside of us that governs our behavior to some degree or another, and causes us to feel guilty if our conscience is not clear, but these things that I'm describing here are not like organs that can be surgically removed or replaced. These things seem to me to fall into the spiritual realm. Things that we can't see or describe, but know that they have a profound effect on our day to day living.

On page 55 in the Big Book, it says "deep down in every man, woman, and child, is the fundamental idea of God." This statement does not exclude anyone and I believe that we all can access that fundamental idea, and call it anything we want to. Even the militant atheist has a conscience and has that fundamental idea inside himself as well, and when it comes to alcoholism, he often bridges the gap when he comes to an understanding of this and is satisfied with a more generic description, such as "a power greater than myself." It's just that simple. The main thing is to come to recognize and to separate the literal ideas from the figurative ideas and drop the prejudgment of what other people use to find their path to enlightenment.

We all seem to come into A.A. on the defensive. Life hasn't been good to us, up to that point, and we have been conditioned to defend ourselves, after all, we are used to getting the short end of the stick. When we cross that line in our lives when we realize that we are not immortal and, if we don't do something about it, we may cause irreparable damage to ourselves, our families, or others, we show up at A.A. and begin the slow process of excepting outside input. Most of us resist this and only give it up a little at a time.

In tradition two in the 12X12, it speaks of "a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience". Throughout all my years in the program, the answers to most of my problems came from the collective input of

others that came before me, in the program. Much of my intuition didn't come from a comment or a word, but came in fragments of many different comments and words which my inner self collected without my knowing and the answers were there when I needed them. My part in it was to find the strength to surrender to something other than my own failed thinking. Strength to surrender sounds like an oxymoron ,but I find it to be essential to crossing over into a way of thinking that has worked on alcoholics in the millions, and all I had to do was to let go of my egocentric thinking, start listening to others and , let the healing begin. My higher power did the rest.

TRADITION EIGHT

Short Form

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

Long Form

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we might otherwise have to engage non-alcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. "12 Step" work is never to be paid for.

Tradition History

In 1942, Father Ed Dowling, who was Bill's spiritual advisor, suggested that Bill and Dr. Bob could not accept money for 12 step work but should accept royalties from the sales of the Big Book as compensation for special services—this later formed the basis for Tradition 8.

Workers in an A.A. Office are just paving the way for 12 Step Work. By telling a shaky A.A. Newcomer where the nearest meeting is, or by helping a drunk get a referral to County Services for detox and recovery, they are helping to make it possible for that alcoholic to hear the message person to person and face to face. Right contacts with the outside have to be maintained, A.A. lifelines have to be tended so we hire A.A staff members. Books and literature do not package and channel themselves all over the world. In our Central Office, without our office manager to do the bookkeeping and co-ordinate the volunteer staff we would be less able to help the alcoholic. As a volunteer at TVCO I find it exciting to help someone buy their first Big Book and Twelve X Twelve. It is the very beginning of their A.A. Experience and a rewarding part of mine.

Our 12th Step Work is never to be paid for, but those who labor in service for us are worthy of their hire.

Friends of Dr. Bob and Bill W. Meeting notes aboard the Sapphire Princess twenty-eight day Polynesia cruise

Years ago one of the fellows present, Dick, says he heard about the program, turns to the guy next to him at a meeting and says: "I don't think this is enough." Bill W. answers: 'Dick, its one day at a time."

During a guy's share we hear all about HER problem. We want you to know about your problem. Let's get into the solution, your solution. If you've done the 3rd_ step completely she is no longer your business.

You made me feel like a new-comer with all the new discoveries I've made with you on this cruise. This has been an awesome experience. I've learned more about the 12steps during these cruise meetings than any others. It seemed we were empowered to find solutions to our problems by those who had a bit more experience and time than I had. There is no way I can go from Step I through Step 12 and not have a spiritual experience. The steps are a recipe, not a menu. N.U.T.S. = Not Using The Steps.

Meetings

Even now, with all these years, I feel deep down that everyone should do it my way. My character defects return but they are diminished and occur less often. I need to admit when I am doing wrong. I know that the steps are a way to a faith that works but why do I have to keep repeating them? Am I brain-damaged or something? Long term sobriety is becoming more of a challenge than my early years. It has become too easy to go on automatic and let my program languish. So I went out and got some guys to sponsor. This is why I have to keep going to meetings. The magic is in the meetings. I need to try being aware. I forget how to use the tools if I don't go to meetings to be reminded. My business coming here was to learn how to do things I didn't want to do and not do the things I want to do. In AA there is always a solution. I cannot afford to think and react like a normal person.

I am a recovered and recovering alcoholic. I am recovered from a hopeless addiction to alcohol and I am recovering from a series, a collection, of character defects. I am happy with what I have today. I learn a lot from newcomers. My challenge in sobriety is keeping a beginner's mind. I remember a roomful of strangers welcomed me with open arms.

Everybody here has so much experience, strength, and wisdom. Repetition is so important to me. What I hear in meetings has a 72 hour shelf-life. I need to hear the messages again and again. AA is a great journey and I belong to it and the incredible group of people that make up AA. I don't come to meetings to get good; I come to meetings to get well. I get tools in the meeting that helps me live well. I no longer see red. If someone 'out there' annoys me all I have to do is move my feet. The simplicity of the program keeps me here. My sponsor protects me from my alcoholic mind. I am reminded I have a deadly disease and that I must not forget that.



Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol.






