THE HEART OF SPIRITUALITY

What a difficult time we have making the transition, *in our thinking*, from the conditioning we have received in a largely materialistic world, to a life based on spiritual principles. Most of the people around us have a relatively easy time of it, mainly because they aren't burdened with the disease of alcoholism. They have a life *perspective* that is *closer to the centerline* when it comes to the fears, insecurities, inferiorities, guilt, etc. etc, that the alcoholic faces every day of his/her life. The level of discomfort, caused by these defects, seldom changes without a continuous effort, on our part, to replace them with thoughts and actions that keep this faulty perception in check. It is well known among AA members who have tried to go it alone, based on their knowledge, and have failed, that we may have to *change our whole approach*.

The transition, I referred to, is a most difficult leap to make. This is mainly because of the defiant thinking that we, as alcoholics, have relied upon to protect us from the various authority/ religious/establishment figures, and *our perceptions* of what THEY were trying to get us think and do. Normal people don't resist these things to the degree that we do, only because *their perception*, of these things, is not nearly as threatening to them as it is to us.

For us, it should be simple to go from a material/practical line of thought to a spiritual/unselfish way of thinking, but it seems that we have to go all the way around the world in order to settle into this simple transition. Why is this so difficult for us? I believe that the word SPIRITUAL often throws a monkey wrench into the works. I believe that our *preconceived ideas*, based on our conditioning, of what is meant by the word spiritual, is what many of us struggle with or, we *simply dismiss it as, more religious dogma*, and If we can find a way bridge that gap, we can get on with a life that is unimaginably good.

The things we come to understand in alcoholics anonymous is that, in order to live a happy and contented life, we have to overcome all the fear, insecurities, low self esteem, guilt..., by starting the practice of doing unselfish things in order to overcome our neediness. If we do these things long enough, we find that we are better off than before. (our perception changes) Things seem to be less threatening and this inspires, (in-spirits) us to reach out even further and see where it takes us.

In the beginning of our AA journey, we are encouraged to take on service

responsibilities. Sometimes this is the first time that we step out of character and do something for others with no expectation of material reward, but we do end up with an unexpected reward. It lifts our <u>spirit</u> and we finally feel that we are a part of something. Oh!!!, There's that word <u>spirit</u> again. If, for the purpose of AA, we just replaced the word spiritual with selflessness, I think it would take all the difficult transitional road blocks out of the way. I personally can't see that much difference in the two, for my way of thinking.

About fifteen years ago I heard a well known motivational speaker ask, Q."What do you get when you squeeze an orange? A. Orange juice. Q. Why? A. Because that's all that's in there. Next, Q. What do you get when you squeeze Mother Teresa? A. Love. Q. Why? Because that's all that's in there." I believe that spirituality is very close to selflessness.

The action that we take when reaching out to others, is the first step in understanding unselfish/ spiritual principles. When we do these things in the spirit of brightening the life of another, and not for the recognition we are going to receive, we heal both ourselves and the recipient. I believe that, THE UNSELFISH MOTIVE (regarding what we do for, and how we treat others), is THE HEART OF SPIRITUALITY. It would be hard to fault a person for what they do when their motive is PURE AND UNSELFISH. This, I believe, is living in the spirit of all of our principles. That warm feeling in my heart is all the reward I will ever need.

Tradition 9

To get a clearer understanding of the intended message, I think the original long form of Tradition 9 must be reviewed. It reads:

"Each A.A. Group needs the least possible organization. Rotating leadership is the best. The small group may elect its secretary, the large group its rotating committee and the groups of a large Metropolitan area their central or intergroup committee, which often employs a full-time secretary. The Trustees of The Alcoholic Foundation are, in effect, our A.A. General Service Committee. They are the custodians of our A.A. Tradition and the receivers of voluntary A.A. contributions by which we maintain our A.A. General Service Office in New York. They are authorized by the groups to handle our over-all public relations and they guarantee the integrity of our principal newspaper, "The A.A. Grapevine." All such representatives are to be guided in the spirit of service, for true leaders in A.A. are but trusted and experienced servants of the whole. They derive no real authority from their titles; they do not govern. Universal respect is the key to their usefulness."

In every other society I can think of, a layered organization is critical, vital to its continuity. Every society it seems, except Alcoholic Anonymous. "Let's keep it simple" were the last words we heard from its fellow founder to his AA brother on his deathbed, and so it seems that this 9th Tradition has flowered from that very thought.

By keeping to the tradition of the "least possible organization", small groups can limit this to rotating its positions such as secretary, coffee-makers, etc. Larger groups can likewise rotate its Intergroup Boards. Both groups governed by no other, propelled and guided solely by the sprit of service.

In recognizing that the true leaders in AA are nothing but experienced and trusted servants, we can take pride in this difference between authority and service, two concepts that are at times polar opposites.

It is in the spiritual principles given to us through Alcoholics Anonymous that intense gratitude is born in us, and with that, this sprit of service. As Bill wrote in the Grapevine in 1948:" With such assurances, we shall without doubt, continue to improve and extend our vital lifelines of special service; to better carry out our A.A. message to others; to make for ourselves a finer greater society, and, God willing, to assure Alcoholics Anonymous a long life and perfect unity.

Newcomers' Gnashing Lyn P. Unity Hall

AA members are eclectic: some are highly educated lawyers, doctors, business owners, while others have yet to obtain a high school diploma; some are side-splitting comedic in sharing their emotional pain, while others spew forth hair-curling expletives while expressing their frustration; some shuffle in dazed and confused, sitting in a far corner of the room, head hung low during the meeting, while others are riding on a cloud of sober contentment and twelfth-step compassion, tending to the small things like pouring coffee, circulating a phone list, bringing snacks, cleaning the room after the meeting and other such tasks.

One of the hallmarks of the meetings for which I'm grateful is that most are structured in an organized, agenda fashion, often forbidding cross-talk while encouraging those present to share, in a general way, one's experience, strength and hope. For the most part, this is how I try to structure my sharing, but as a writer, I often begin my stories 'en media res'-- in middle of something either indescribably good, perceptibly bad, or downright ugly.

In almost four years of sobriety, I've learned to be tolerant of those conveying life experiences in a pinball machine or ticker-tape fashion because that's how my thought process goes when it's awry. Thoughts precede mood which precedes action which precedes drinking, in my case, to quell the tears, the fear, the insecurity, the anger, most of which I've concocted in my pretty, little head.

So, I get it (though I may not have experienced all of the dynamics of their imposed woe) when a newcomer dumps a litany of problematic, seemingly insurmountable, thoroughly overwhelming, tearful experiences which brought them to seek – something – empathy, help, commiseration, court card signatures -- in the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA).

On occasion, an old-timer will chime in about someone's lengthy, breathless, run-on sentences (not in the editorial sense, either), suggesting that AA isn't group therapy, that the Big Book, working the twelve steps, recruiting a sponsor and not drinking assuredly leads to many solutions to the problems plaguing newcomers – one day at a time. These old-timers can be blunt and stoic, sometimes reprimanding and indignant. I get this facet of an old-timer's persona, too. Though long sober, perhaps life has momentarily demanded their full attention, which preempts their otherwise boundless tolerance. On occasion, I've been distracted and irascible that way, too.

I know at times I have trouble keeping up with the voiced, exasperating series of events which obscure any and all proposed solutions for a newcomer's alcoholism, so I just listen and let them talk and talk and talk (if I'm clocking them). After the meeting, I proffer tissue, a phone list, a ride, or my phone number which she can call at any time, maybe offer coffee at Starbuck's. Above all, I advise her to keep coming back. I steer the men toward the tenured male members.

"It's the easiest thing I've ever, ever done: I keep coming back. There's a seat here for you and the coffee's always on," I say, as if it's my own, AA tag line.

I'm thankful that I can just sit and listen, or read, or share, or fill in for or assist the secretary, or tend to someone new as I ponder the variety of folks walking in and out of our room, sober or not, talkative or not, patient or not.

Newcomers don't understand quite a few things, least of all alcoholism and exactly how AA can help them. Admittedly, I'm not entirely reconciled with being a member of AA, but I know where to go to share my *en media res* experience, my beleaguered strength and my refreshed hope, because there's a seat there for me and the coffee's always on. I feel relieved when I show up and I feel peace when I leave the meetings. My name's Lyn and I'm an alcoholic.
