ON THE 5TH STEP . . (FROM AA GRAPEVINE ARCHIVES)

"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

ADMITTING "the nature of our wrongs" to God and ourselves sounds much easier than confessing to another human being. We can do the first in complete privacy. No one is listening, we say. Yet, it's not so easy that we all are able to accomplish this Step in one sweeping confession. Several false starts sometimes are necessary before we find both the courage and the insight to admit even to ourselves the true, unvarnished nature of our wrongs.

One of the obstacles to applying this Step is our deep-rooted habit of refusing to

face facts, or admit the truth even to ourselves if and whenever the truth was unpleasant. We are grooved in the pattern of glossing over, covering up, beating around the mulberry bush, sticking our head in the sand--or any of the other old clichés which are simply an indirect and longer way of spelling "l-i-e."

The truth is that during the active drinking period the patient has been doing more lying to himself than to anyone else and even after he has decided to turn to the truth finds the way strange and difficult to follow. After 15 to 20 years of self-deception the truth is not easily recognized.

At first, the application of part of this Step may seem to have been achieved. The newly enlightened patient has

had a heart-to-heart talk with himself. He has admitted to himself the nature of his wrongs. Or, has he admitted only part of the nature of his wrongs? Has he spared himself just a little, left just a little of the varnish on the truth? Has he spared himself again in just a bit more self-deception, in just one or two self-pitying reasons or explanations of the wrongs?

Frequently, a second and a third confession, more, is needed before the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth is brought to light. Sometimes a great deal of digging is needed to get beneath the many layers of self-deception that have been piled on each other and become virtually petrified over the years.

searching analysis and perseverance are needed here, the courage to face and admit the truth as it's brought to the surface, and the perseverance to keep digging until it is.

Usually the presence of an audience intensifies the difficulties of admitting self-truths, even when the audience is a sympathetic friend. Sometimes the mere voicing of inner secrets is a wrenching process, especially for anyone who for years has been hiding all unpleasant facts even from himself. Furthermore, one must forgive himself before he is ready to forgive the world of which he has been so resentful.

For these reasons many who have succeeded in the full practice of this Step recommend that it be started with one's own conscience as the sole audience. Better begin there, they say, first to learn what there is to be admitted and, second, to generate the courage to take another into the confidence.

But, all who have practiced the Step successfully are quick to say, too, that the tremendous relief which follows richly compensates for whatever mental pain and labor may be experienced in the beginning. Confession, of course, has eased men all through history. Its rewards have not diminished and are within reach of the A.A. who has advanced to this point in his recovery of a useful and happy way of life.

TRADITION FIVE

Here is where we find the text of Tradition Five:

- 1] Tradition Five (Page 150):
 “Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.”
- 2] Tradition Five Long Form (Page 190):
 “Each Alcoholics Anonymous group ought to be a spiritual entity having but one primary purpose – that of carrying its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.”
- 3] Contents (Page 10-11):
 “Tradition Five
 ‘Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.’
 Better do one thing well than many badly. The life of our Fellowship depends on this principle. The ability of each A.A. to identify himself with and bring recovery to the newcomer is a gift from God...passing on this gift to others is our one aim. Sobriety can’t be kept unless it is given away.”

Sometimes it is often good to review what we can find in the Grapevine regarding Tradition Five:

“TRADITIONS CHECKLIST from the A.A. Grapevine”
 These questions were originally published

in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

1. Do I ever cop out by saying, “I’m not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn’t apply to me”?
2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?”

When we read the story that accompanies Tradition Five in The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, we come in contact with a “hard-to-sell” consumer. The story is about an alcoholic that is met in Town’s Hospital where he is a patient of Dr. Silkworth. He is a belligerent Irishman who doesn’t want to hear the message at first. He believes that the visitor is there to “sell him something.” He even believes that at once the mention of the word “spiritual” is spoken, that the visitor is trying to sell him “religion”. The Irishman goes on to

tell about his own role in the Church and that he is probably a better judge of religion than anything that could be said by the Alcoholic visitor. The visiting Alcoholic decides to tell the patient exactly what he thinks of him and says to him, “I think you’re just a conceited Irishman who thinks he can run the whole show.” This simmers the man down and he begins to listen. At the conclusion of the story, we find out that the visiting Alcoholic becomes the man’s sponsor and this is what the patient says about the Alcoholic who is there to “carry the message”:

“My sponsor sold me one idea, and that was sobriety. At the time, I couldn’t have bought anything else.”

This is something we can always remember when thinking about Tradition Five:

**I am responsible.
 When anyone, anywhere,
 reaches out for help, I want
 be hand of AA always to be there.
 And for that: I am responsible.**





"You're grateful that most of the meetings are only an hour long and that there are many from which to choose, open or closed, long or short?" I asked Jane Barleycorn.

"No! Tong read the whole chapter. Mason *always* shares a death report about people back *out there*. Willy refilled cups for the coffee drinkers. Banny came in and out, smelling like an ash tray. The old-timer, Walt, ranted about some newcomer blowing his anonymity out of the AA Waters. JoJo's cell phone played the Bohemian Rhapsody, interrupting the meeting. One of the new guys from the Sally puked all over the place. I caught Gordon staring at me. He knows I don't believe in the higher power thing, though I've asked God to get me out of some tough scrapes. Here I sit wondering when He's going to rescue me," said Jane Barleycorn.

"So, you're grateful for the *cautionary* tales. The meeting place seems hospitable. You can come and go as you please. You're relieved that you're not alone as your alcoholism is no longer a dark secret, right? You can actually *hear* JoJo's musical cell phone. You recognized an alcoholic needing help. Surely, you're thankful that you're smack dab in the middle of all of the assistance you could possibly ask for in the rooms of AA," I said.

"No! I had to get a bus pass to get there, then I had to walk five blocks. Henrietta gave me a ride home in her jalopy. I didn't have a dollar to contribute. I didn't recognize one name on the phone list. I'm not calling those people, anyway. I was shakin'

and bakin' when Julie placed a bunch of cookies in front of me. C'mon, I'm trying to watch my waistline! I'm unemployed. Mike told me where to go to file paperwork for benefits. Sylvia's looking for a caregiver for her elderly mom. James gave me a referral to a dentist after I spoke of needing a wisdom tooth pulled. On top of that, everyone keeps telling me to keep coming back. I don't want to be there! I'm forced to go by order of Dogg Ed Apathy. Look at this ratty signature card, would 'ya? It's embarrassing!" she said, exasperated.

"Oh! You're grateful that this city has a bus route and you're able to walk on a beautiful day? You made acquaintance with sweet Henrietta, right? You don't have to contribute anything. The program is freely given, like the phone list. Merely tools in your growing sobriety kit. You're grateful that the cookies settled you a bit. You're *entitled* to state benefits while you search for a job. Sylvia thinks enough about you to share a personal need. James is empathetic to your wisdom...*teeth*. You're participating in your recovery. I'm sure you can find a more appealing attendance card," I offered.

My alter ego, Jane Barleycorn, made frequent appearances in my first year of sobriety. Four years later, she still doesn't know any better than to leave *little, negative remnants* as a calling card. Thus, I attend many meetings. I watch. I learn. I listen. I share. I'm of service. Today, Jane's perspective is... interesting. However, *wholesome, daily*

gratitude leaves *bountiful remnants* calling me...Sober!

STEP FIVE GUIDELINES


Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs

How It Works



This is perhaps difficult, especially discussing our defects with another person. We think we have done well enough in admitting these things to ourselves. There is doubt about that. In actual practice, we usually find a solitary self-appraisal insufficient. Many of us thought it necessary to go much further. We will be more reconciled to discussing ourselves with another person when we see good reasons why we should do so. The best reason first: If we skip this vital step, we may not overcome drinking. Time after time newcomers have tried to keep to themselves certain facts about their lives. Trying to avoid this humbling experience, they have turned to easier methods. Almost invariably they got drunk. Having persevered with the rest of the program, they wondered why they fell. We think the reason is that they never completed their housecleaning. They took inventory all right, but hung on to some of the worst items in stock. They only *thought* they had lost their egoism and fear; they only *thought* they had humbled themselves. But they had not learned enough of humility, fearlessness and honesty, in the sense we find it necessary, until they told someone else *all* their life story.
