BEING OPEN MINDED

When we are born, we come into the world untainted and perfectly innocent. From that time on, we are influenced by everything we experience in life, good and bad. If we are loved and nurtured, we may develop a feeling of trust and safety, but if, as it sometimes happens, we get our hand slapped when we pick up something from the coffee table, it may trigger an attitude of defiance and resistance. These two opposites are just examples of the many conflicts we encounter in a lifetime. We are conditioned to think and react in a certain way as the result of the influences we are exposed to.

Newcomers in Alcoholics Anonymous, and even some seasoned veterans, often find it hard to grasp a concept of "a power greater than ourselves." This is probably the biggest hurdle we in AA have to face in our search for a happy and meaningful life. Once we get past all of our resistance to the concept of a higher power, it becomes much easier to proceed with the rest of the program. The word God means something different to just about everyone that is having difficulty with it, and if God alone was the answer, why do priests and ministers come to AA for treatment; why not just go to church?

Alcoholics Anonymous is here for all alcoholics that want to get sober regardless of their approach to faith. Anyone that thinks that we are trying to convert someone into a religion or out of a religion is simply misguided. The Big book and the 12X12 have many comments explaining this, but unfortunately this old conditioning, bolstered by the EGO, seems to block some of us from breaking down the resistance on this subject, or some members may just fake it to appear to be going along with the program, but never getting the results. If we denied the possibility of a God of the different religious groups, they could not have AA available to them, and if we made it a requirement that we picked one of those beliefs, atheists would be left out.

If a person believes that he doesn't have a higher power, I might remind him/her that alcohol was more powerful or else why would he need AA. With this in mind, I might suggest that he may only need to find a power greater than alcohol to begin with, then, as it says in the 12X12, "To acquire it, I had only to stop fighting and practice the rest of A.A.'s program as enthusiastically as I could." As I look back on it now, I realize that was exactly the way I found my way through this dilemma. I find absolutely no conflict in any approach that one discovers on his own, only that he practice the rest of the program with enthusiasm.

What it seems to imply is that if we trust the process and just do the suggestions, you will find a suitable understanding of a power greater than yourself that you can do business with. I'm still not sure what or who (if you like) I am asking for guidance from, but I'm open minded about these,

and I have to let everyone find their own brand of enlightenment, without prejudging anyone else's approach on this matter. I believe that changing my perception was what put me firmly on the road to recovery. The only thing that I have to resist is my EGO, and the way I do that is by living by sound and unselfish principles, many of which are discussed in AA meetings, and many are assimilated through osmosis as I continue to put 2 and 2 together. It's not that complicated. As long as I don't get caught up in the debate, and just follow the simplest suggestions, it all works out just fine.

ON THE 6TH STEP....AA GRAPEVINE April 1947 Vol. 3 No. 11

"We're entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."

AFTER the preceding Steps, this one shouldn't be too tough. Already, we have admitted that we were powerless over alcohol; that we would take a moral inventory to do something about it. Generally, an honest self-analysis discloses a number of items on the "wrong side of the ledger." We can do something about many of them. However, we discover a number of defects that we can't do anything about. The 6th Step is considered in the light of this latter type of defect.

The question of personal honesty comes to mind. Many of us became thoroughly dishonest with ourselves after years of alcoholism. Many of us reached the point where honesty was almost impossible. We rationalized. We evaded. We lied. We refused to face the truth of a situation. In the end, we had made a habit of personal dishonesty. Such a habit was not easy to break.

Another common defect among persons, especially sick alcoholics, is selfishness. Many of us reached the point where it was almost impossible to be unselfish. When drinking, most of us were terribly selfish. When sober, many of us found little time to think of the welfare of others. Again, this defect became a habit. In some cases, the habit became an obsession. We became fascinated and intrigued with ourselves.

Such defects of character cannot be removed without help. Try as we might to "turn over a new leaf," or "mend our ways," we found ourselves slipping back into the old, well established habit patterns that were part of our alcoholic sickness.

But there is an answer to this very common problem. In fact, the answer is so obvious, so simple and so near at hand that many of us did not see it at all. The complete solution to the character defect lies in this 6th Step. Some persons call it surrender. Some call it transference. We call it common sense.

Isn't it common sense to ask for assistance in an emergency? Would you try to lift a 1,000-pound weight without help? If your child is ill, doesn't it make sense to ask for the help of a doctor? Of course it does.

Defects of character will retard your recovery and mine. They will take from us that thing that we hold dearest: our sobriety. And if we lose our sobriety, we die. Does it make sense to seek help from a Higher Power in removing these dangerous defects? The answer is obvious.

Reach into your soul and admit that you cannot remove these defects alone. Humbly ask God's help with these life-destroying problems. We must call on the "fellow upstairs" for life. Get ready to do it. Be determined to see it through. If you do, you can't miss because He can't miss. He's the one who is doing the job.

A REITERATION OF TRADITION SIX

Tradition Six, Alcoholics Anonymous

An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

The Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous is to the individual, as the Twelve Traditions is to the group." As with the "Steps," the "Traditions" rely upon one another and work in unity to help us, individually and as groups "(to) stay sober and help a fellow alcoholic achieve sobriety. " For example, in Tradition One, "Our common welfare comes first, personal recovery depends on A.A. unity." In Tradition Five, "Each group has but one primary purpose to carry its message to the alcoholic that still suffers." These two traditions help us in better understanding the principle of Tradition Six and its application to our Groups and our Fellowship -

Unity.

Much like recovering (or recovered) alcoholics sharing their experience, strength, and hope to the still suffering alcoholic, as it relates to the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous; our predecessors have shared their experience, strength, and hope to our groups, as it relates to the **Traditions of Alcoholics** Anonymous. Tradition Six is the subject of our review here today. Previously, Tradition Six, in written form, was a much longer version than what we have today. However, in essence remains unchanged in context. A copy provided here...

"Problems of money, property, and authority may easily divert us from our primary spiritual aim. We think, therefore, that any considerable

property of genuine use to A.A. should be separately incorporated and managed, thus dividing the material from the spiritual. An A.A. group, as such, should never go into business. Secondary aids to A.A., such as clubs or hospitals which require much property or administration, ought to be incorporated and so set apart that, if necessary, they can be freely discarded by the groups. Hence such facilities ought not to use the A.A. name. Their management should be the sole responsibility of those people who financially support them. For clubs, A.A. managers are usually preferred. But hospitals, as well as other places of recuperation, ought to be well outside A.A.—and medically supervised. While an A.A. group may cooperate with anyone, such cooperation ought never to go so far as affiliation or endorsement, actual or implied. An A.A. group can bind itself to no one. " Alcoholics Anonymous, 4th Edition (Page 563-564)

The context of the "long form" of Tradition Six provides some insights into what our fellowship was experiencing in its early stages of growth and development. Concerns surrounding money, property, authority, dividing the material from the spiritual, finance, affiliation or endorsement, and other related issues; was of paramount concern to our predecessors. Today, as a fellowship, it ought be ours too.

An editorial on Tradition Six, published in The A.A. Grapevine May 1948, by one of A.A.'s Founders, Bill W., reads...

"The sixth of our 12 Points of A.A. Tradition is deemed so important that it states at length the relation of the A.A. movement to money and property.

Too detailed to print here, this Tradition declares in substance that the accumulation of money, property and the unwanted personal authority so often generated by material wealth comprise a cluster of serious hazards against which an A.A. group must ever be on quard.

Tradition 6 also enjoins the group never to go into business nor ever to lend the A.A. name or money credit to any "outside" enterprise, no matter how good. Strongly expressed is the opinion that even clubs should not bear the A.A. name; that they ought to be separately incorporated and managed by those individual A.A.s who need or want clubs enough to financially support them.

We would thus divide the spiritual from the material, confine the A.A. movement to its sole aim and insure (however wealthy as individuals we may become) that A.A itself shall always remain poor. We dare not risk the distractions of corporate wealth. Years of experience have proven these principles beyond doubt. They have become certainties, absolute verities for us.

Thank God, we A.A.s have never yet been caught in the kind of religious or political disputes which embroil the world of today. But we ought to face the fact that we have often quarreled violently about money, property and the administration thereof. Money, in quantity, has always been a baleful influence in group life. Let a well meaning donor present an A.A. group with a sizeable sum and we break loose. Nor does trouble abate until that group, as such, somehow disposes of its bank roll. This experience is practically universal. "But," say our friends, "isn't this a confession of weakness? Other organizations do a lot of good with money. Why not A.A.?"

Of course, we of A.A. would be the first to say that many a fine enterprise does a lot of good with a lot of money. To these efforts, money is usually primary; it is their life blood. But money is not the life blood of A.A. With us, it is very secondary. Even in small quantities, it is scarcely more than a necessary nuisance, something we wish we could do without entirely. Why is that so? We explain this easily enough; we don't need money. The core of our A.A. procedure is "one alcoholic talking to another," whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all A.A. needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars a piece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions. Trivial indeed, our expenses!

Nowadays, the A.A. group answers its well wishers saying, "Our expenses are trifling. As good earners, we can easily pay them. As we neither need nor want money, why risk its hazards? We'd rather stay poor. Thanks just the same!"

In essence, both the long form version of Tradition Six and Bill W's editorial on the same provide the strong suggestion..." divide the material from the spiritual." After all, the program of Alcoholics Anonymous is a Spiritual Program based on principles found in the Twelve Steps, Twelve Traditions, and the Twelve Concepts. Today's version of Tradition Six is succinct and to the point...basically, reminding us to not allow the material divert us from our primary purpose – to stay sober and help a fellow alcoholic achieve sobriety. In keeping with the theme of The Traditions relying upon one another stated at the outset, let's end with the Twelfth Tradition... Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of

all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

"Ten out of ten people die, so don't take life too seriously."

"Be profound, funny or quiet."

"After you share in a meeting, listen to hear if you said anything."

"I don't need your help today.... Love, God."

"Want to hear God laugh? Tell Him your plans."

"Now I can wake up and say, "Good morning, God!" rather than "Good God, it's morning!"

"When I turned myself over to God, I took my life out of the hands of an idiot."

"When the world comes to an end, it will do so without my permission."

"If you pray for a Cadillac and God sends a jackass, ride it."

"There's no one too dumb for this program, but it's possible to be too smart."

"All I wanted was to control you, myself and everything else."

"Try praying. Nothing pleases God more than to hear a strange voice." PAGE 7

It is suggested that the temporary contact take the newcomer to a variety of AA meetings; introduce him or her to other AA's; ensure that he or she has some phone numbers of several AA members and share the experience of sponsorship and a home group.

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

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
