### In gratitude, Bill explains a plan to preserve AA. . .but not to rule it!

THANKSGIVING is coming. And with it, Tradition Week. I never felt happier.

Our traditions are set down on paper. But they were written first in our hearts. For each of us knows, instinctively I think, that AA is not ours to do with as we please. We are but caretakers to preserve the spiritual quality of our fellowship; keep it whole for those who will come after us and have need of what has so generously been given to us.

We learned our lesson about money early. We feared organization lest we solidify and destroy ourselves as a *movement*! At the same time we faced the moral and humane obligation to make our program instantly available to all who asked for it. And they came in ever increasing numbers.

Yes, we've had need of money and we've had to provide services. But we've resolved never to allow either money or the management of our necessary affairs to obscure our spiritual aims. The same loving God whose Divine Wisdom has shown us that one desperate and shaky drunk, fumbling for a nickel to call for help, looms larger than any 'organization' we shall ever have, or need!

At Cleveland, July last, 7000 AAs set their approval to the Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous. We took our destiny by the hand. Alcoholics Anonymous had grown up.

Three of those Traditions define the "Services" of Alcoholics Anonymous and outline our collective responsibility for them--management responsibility and money responsibility. The Tradition also says that our trusted servants shall never govern; that they shall

always be directly accountable to those they serve.

We who work in your Headquarters are delighted with the result. Groups who never helped before have now done so. New groups, very small groups, institutional groups not really under any obligation, have made sacrifices. If this keeps up, our deficit at Headquarters will be a thing of the past. Never have I been so encouraged about the future of our Services. Your generous and responsible action makes a fitting setting for the news I am about to give you.

For twelve years, warmly aided by great friends, Dr. Bob and I have stood sentinel over your Headquarters. We have been holding these valuable assets in trust for you--your General Service Office, your book "Alcoholics Anonymous", your principal magazine *The A.A. Grapevine*, your public relations, your common funds. We have never asked you to take any direct responsibility for them. But times have changed. Alcoholics Anonymous is now grown. Its founders are perishable. We cannot be your guardians always.

So the hour is come when you must take these things into your own keeping. We ask that you guard them well for the future of Alcoholics Anonymous may much depend on how you maintain and support these life-giving Arms of Service.

Anticipating that you will happily accept this new responsibility, the Trustees, Dr. Bob and I propose *The General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous;* a body of State and Provincial representatives who will sit yearly with our Foundation Trustees as their traditional guide. We have long considered and will soon present a detailed plan designed to bring this great change about.

Alcoholics Anonymous *has* come of age. It's a great Thanksgiving!

## STEPS

Editorial: On the 11th Step. . .

"Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understand Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."

IT is often wisely said in A.A. that we should not become over-anxious, should not expect to get the whole program overnight, but should take the steps one at time when we feel that we are ready for them. This means that although we are not ready at a given time to take this step or that one and are, therefore, not then taking it, we should be disposing ourselves toward it. It never means that we should plan on avoiding any of the steps.

Practice of the 11th Step is the surest method of disposing oneself toward all the other steps. It was only through seeking contact with God through meditation and prayer that some of us came to believe in Him and became willing to turn our wills and our lives over to Him. The wish to improve that contact, the searching for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry it out, gives us strength to make amends, to do the things necessary to remake our lives.

Unless we improve our contact with God we will gradually lose it. There will be a slow return to indifference and we will suffer that let-down that so many experience after a few months in A.A. Gradually old desires return with increasingly great urgency. The alteration in conduct that we have made for a few months has not been sufficiently sustained to lead to a change in character, and the deeper habit patterns reassert themselves. Growth in spiritual understanding alone will dispose us to make the effort to recondition ourselves, to change our emotional attitudes and bring about a true character change.

For specific suggestions for practicing the 11th Step we turn to the book *Alcoholics Anonymous*, as we do on all A.A. questions, before going ahead on our own. Applying the wisdom we find there, we turn with newly awakened interest and intensity to the practices September 1945 Vol. 2 No. 4

of our particular religious denomination, if we have one; we sometimes select and memorize a few set prayers; we may study the recorded thoughts of others; but in any event we make it a practice in the morning to ask God to guide us during the day, and thank Him at the day's close for His many blessings. We are careful never to pray for our own selfish ends, but ask especially for freedom from self-will and knowledge of God's will for us.

Some of us have found the following verse helpful on awakening, when all our wishes and hopes for the day rush at us like wild animals; the first thing we must do is shove them all back, and listen to that other voice, letting a calmer, quieter, stronger life flow into us:"Every morning rest your arms awhile upon the window-sill of Heaven and gaze upon your Lord, and with that vision in your heart turn strong to meet your day."

All of which, of course, is calculated to keep us from taking that first drink. It works --it really does.

# TRADITIONS

### Tradition 11

It is my opinion that the entire **intent** of the 11<sup>th</sup> Tradition is summed up in the first sentence of the long form: "Our relations with the general public should be characterized by personal anonymity."

# What is "Anonymity"? Simply stated, it means: "without an acknowledged name."

Like many of the others, the 11<sup>th</sup> Tradition was hammered out of many painful experiences in the early stages of our Fellowship. It was decided from those experiences that our Society would adopt a most unusual public relations policy:

"Attraction rather than promotion".

To quote Dr. Bob Smith—"There are 2 ways to break the Anonymity tradition: (1) by giving your name at the public level; and (2) by being so anonymous that you can't be reached by other drunks. The AA who hides his identity from his fellow AA by using only a given name violates the tradition just as much as the AA who permits his name to appear in the press. The former is maintaining his anonymity ABOVE the level of press radio and film--whereas the latter is maintaining his anonymity BELOW the level of press radio and film.". The Tradition designates a demarcation, an exact level where the line of anonymity should be held. "We need always maintain personal anonymity <u>AT</u> the level of press, radio, and film."

As the <u>**12 Steps</u>** are characterized by each one's guiding spiritual principles, so are some of our 12 Traditions as well. The 2 principles most associated with our 11<sup>th</sup> Tradition would be Humility and Trust.</u>

What Dr. Bob was saying is that by breaking anonymity and promoting us at the public level, HU-MILITY is lost... replaced by our Ego and selfpromotion, and our great blessing is spoiled. Breaking another member's anonymity to anyone outside the AA group, or being so anonymous that we cannot be of service to another sufferer breaks the principle of TRUST, and without trust virtually ALL other steps in the program are unattainable.

As Bill Wilson wrote in our Grapevine back in 1948:

"Good public relations are AA *lifelines*, reaching out to the brother alcoholic who still does not know us. So the 11<sup>th</sup> Tradition stands sentinel over these lifelines, announcing that there is no need for self-praise, and that our whole public relation policy should be based on attraction rather than promotion. Be assured that we shall never weaken the lifelines, which we float out to you. In our public relations we shall, God will, keep the faith".

# GRATITUDE MONTH OF NOVEMBER

For decades now, AAs in the U.S. have set aside all of November as Gratitude Month – marking the occasion with special contributions to the Offices around the country. In the spirit of the Seventh Tradition, A.A. is self-supporting through its members' contributions, and frequently turns away money from well-meaning outside contributors. ### **BRIDGING THE GAP**

Bridging the Gap is designed to help an alcoholic between a treatment program or prison make the transition. One of the more slippery places in the journey to sobriety is between the door of a facility and the nearest AA group or meeting. AA experience suggests that attending meetings regularly is critical. In order to Bridge the Gap, AA members have volunteered to be temporary contacts & introduce newcomers to AA. It is suggested that the temporary contact take the newcomer to a variety of AA meetings; introduce him or her to other AA's; ensure that he or she has some phone numbers of several AA members and share the experience of sponsorship and a home group.

Temecula Valley is in the process of coordinating this committee. Volunteers are needed.


