With Peter, Wildomar

I met Peter for our talk at Temecula Valley Central Office on Saturday, 6/1/19. It was a busy morning with the phones ringing and fellowship dropping in for purchases for themselves and their meetings.

Peter started his journey in sobriety with a family intervention in 1985. For 30 years he has struggled with relapse after relapse and could not stay sober. It seems "life on life's terms" became too difficult at times for Peter to remain sober. When life was good, Peter often found it easy to be sober and active in Alcoholics Anonymous, but he found himself often blaming the world for his bad circumstances.

His self will took him out over and over. After ruined relationships, the loss of a child, financial hardship, he told himself "Buck-up man! You can get over this!" But alas, Peter would find himself in another relapse. Everything that had become precious to him would again vanish and he would surrender to his alcoholism and drink again.

Before the last relapse, he surveyed his life. His children had grown to adults, he and his girlfriend had a comfortable life, everything on the outside told him that he should be happy. But one more time, he couldn't find a reason to live. He started an 8 year run on binge drinking thinking "I wasn't hurting them. I kept people at a distance, I kept 'them' away from me." This seems to be one of those golden threads that seems to run through every alcoholic's experience from time to time. The desired isolation, the adverse reaction to relationships, love and integrity is too hard for us and an often-unwanted emotion. Peter says that he was never fully convinced of his alcoholism. He didn't want to die but he didn't want to live. There was the "jumping off point". He heard a voice "Give the program one more shot and do what you're told!"

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Peter said, "I was caught between happy and scared when my girlfriend told me I had to leave." He was happy to have another chance to get sober but still scared to go forward. He was disappointed and heartbroken at the realization of another charred relationship.

At that point, he moved into sober living and he felt his eyes were re-opened. He had a strong desire to stay sober. He made a friend there and they hung out and went to meetings together. But when that friend relapsed, Peter felt angry and was sad that the friend had given up his sobriety. He found himself reflecting on his own relapses and discovered that he was not a failure. However, he had failed to do everything that AA "suggests" that he does. He realized that he had to stay convinced that he was an alcoholic. No matter what, he had to read the book, go to meetings, call others and be of service. He desperately felt committed to this balance. "I have so many things I love to do in life that I can't possibly do them all! The unity keeps me willing to recover and serve.

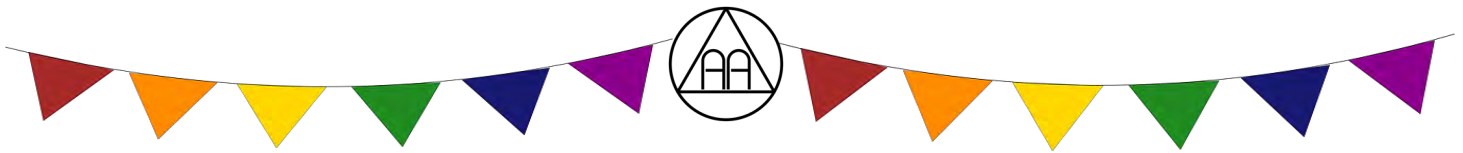
"I like participating in service opportunities. I was invited to become a board member at the Temecula Valley Alano Club about 9 months ago. I have learned a lot about putting principles before personalities and practicing being a

responsible member accountable to others. Practicing the principles in meetings and board meetings has started to spill over into other areas of my life and it feels better to respond than to react. I feel that life has opened some and I am so full of gratitude. I'm very passionate about my service at the Alano Club. We have good sobriety there and we would like to continue making it more homelike and intimate. Much like other clubs in the area. We are looking to form a steering committee to move in that direction and continue to be a safe place to go. Often, we see that people come to just have a safe sober place to relax and connect with likeminded people. I'd like to see the club expand and add quiet places to read and chat and maybe add areas for the whole family."

If given the chance, Peter would tell his newcomer self "If you really want to change your life, you have to be willing to change."

If given the chance to carry a message today, Peter would say that we cannot do any of this alone.

Thanks, Peter for staying sober today! The Unity, Recovery and Service are the three sides of the triangle that keep us coming back and I appreciate you sharing your story with us!



A Brief History of the Big Book

Bill W. and Dr. Bob began discussing the concept of The Big Book after they achieved sobriety. They had developed a program that helped 40 men stay sober, and they believed their system could help others.

In 1938, Bill W. began writing the book. It was published by Bill W. and Dr. Bob in 1939. The original version of The Big Book included Bill's story, a description of alcoholism, the 12 Steps, a letter to agnostics and an outline for recovery. The fourth edition includes most of the original content.

Alcoholics Anonymous revised the book several times to ensure that it accurately represents people with alcohol use disorders across the world. Stories are included in the book to help individuals identify with others who have the disease of alcoholism and to encourage them to try the AA program.

By the time the second edition was published in 1955, about 300,000 copies of the first edition had been sold or distributed. The second edition added appendices, including the 12 traditions of AA and directions for contacting AA. Numerous stories were also added to the second edition, which reached more than 1.1 million people.

The third edition, which added new stories and removed others, was published in 1976. Nearly 20 million copies of that edition entered circulation during the next three decades.

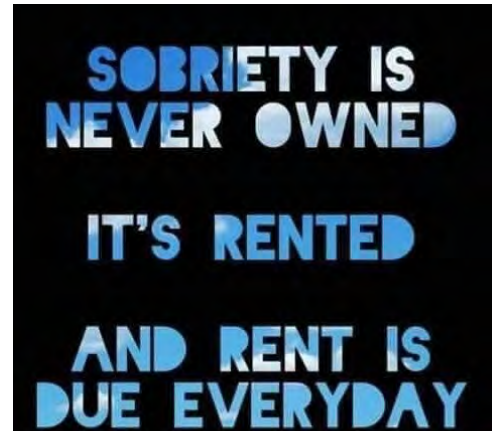
The most recent version of The Big Book was published in 2001. Additions include the 12 concepts of world service, new stories and revisions to old stories. A few stories were also removed.

Concept 7

The Conference shall observe the spirit of A.A. tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government; that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Tradition 7 Long Form:

The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other 2 outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

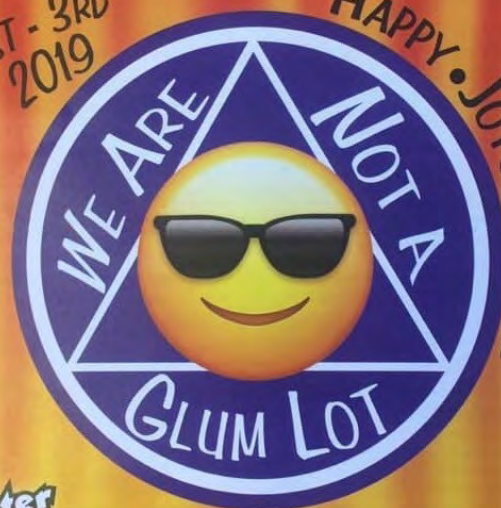
