I've witnessed tremendous spiritual growth in our Valley and have grown by learning and using the 12 Traditions and the 12 Concepts while in service to Central Office and the Valley.

I am actively searching for my replacement as my term comes to an end in the coming months. There are so many talented people in our Valley and this is an amazing opportunity to be of service in so many ways!

The most common thing that I hear from people when asked to serve on any board related to A.A. is that "they are not the board type". I said the exact same thing when I was first asked to be of service in 2013. I was just shy of 2 years sober. I thought to myself, "There is no way I could sit and listen to this dribble month in and month out. Besides, they're doing it wrong anyway! I could work circles around any one of these people!" (insert eyeroll and hair flip) It's a huge understatement to say that it's a challenge to be able to "say what I mean, mean what I say but don't be mean when I say it!" I continuously work on bettering myself in this very specific area as I've fallen very short of the goal on several occasions and on more than one board!

In fact, I didn't even agree to accept that first service commitment in 2013! My grand sponsor threw my hat in the ring as soon as they called for a volunteer at the District 17 meeting for the Grapevine Chairperson. I believe my overly dramatic gasp (how could she?!) punctuated my immediate resentment! She said, "Oh stop, you are perfect for the commitment!" Wait—you had me at "You're perfect..." It was settled! I would be the Perfect Grapevine Chairperson for District 17! (insert fluffing of hair and a wink).

I didn't realize it, but I had just signed on to the beginning of a deep journey into recovery! I'm sure I would have been just fine had I declined to do any of the service commitments I've done in the last eight years. But I wanted something more for my sober life. I wanted something more meaningful. I wanted a true opportunity to practice a deeper level of honesty, a more open mind, more willingness to truly be of service to my fellows. I wanted to understand and practice these character traits on a deeper level because they are all the building blocks of humility. Humility is the thing I want most! The second paragraph of Step 7 in the "12 Steps and 12 Traditions" of Alcoholics Anonymous reads:

"Indeed, the attainment of greater humility is the foundation principle of each of A.A.'s 12 steps. For without some degree of humility, no alcoholic can stay sober at all. Nearly all A.A.'s have found, too, that unless they develop much more of this precious quality than maybe required just for sobriety, they still haven't much chance of becoming truly happy. Without it, they cannot live to much useful purpose, or, in adversity, be able to summon the faith that can meet any emergency."

I don't know about you, but I would like to be truly happy and I would also like to be able to summon the faith that can meet any emergency! Afterall, that kind of behavior seems to be another way to experience the freedom and self-support afforded by recovery! If I had kept the belief that "I am not the board type", I would have limited my own recovery! Why did I have this idea? Is this an old idea? Is it really the truth? Do I want to stay this way?

Being of service to Alcoholics Anonymous at my meeting level, the district level and for Central Office has afforded me the opportunity to grow out of the fear that I am not good enough to help. It has afforded me the opportunity to work on self control. I no longer have the fear that I might do the wrong thing. Mistakes allow me the opportunity to learn and grow. These were my fears I found when I explored why "I am not the board type" in my life.

I thank my Higher Power from my very core for the opportunity to learn about and practice these character traits in such a forgiving atmosphere! A.A. service has taught me leadership skills, communication skills, coaching skills, how to be a good student, how to be objective, how to listen and change my perspective. Service has taught me how to truly


put the needs of others before my own. A.A. service has allowed me to admit when I am wrong and agree to a better way. Although A.A. Service is not about me (and I sometimes drag my feet to attend) I get amazing gifts in return!

How Central Office Serves

During the day, your Central Office keeps the doors open to assist recovering and suffering AA members alike and provide the following services:

- \Rightarrow We provide the Big Book & the 12x12
- ⇒ Grapevine Publications & Other Assorted Literature
- ⇒ Chips & Newcomer Packets.
- ⇒ Meeting Schedules
- ⇒ Information for other Central Offices
- ⇒ 24 Hour Hotline
- ⇒ Organizes 12 Step Calls

Your office manager organizes volunteers, makes sure the office is a healthy place for all, keeps your accounting data accurate, and safe guards your inventory.

The office manager is there to support the groups and the individual members of our fellowship.

We make and distribute your meeting schedules and we publish the Gratitude Gazette. Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, volunteers take calls from suffering alcoholics and organize 12 step calls. The phone

line and special call-forwarding are paid for by your central office contributions.

Please ask at your next business meeting if you are contributing monthly to your Central Office. Being self-supporting means not only paying for your rent and coffee, but also paying for the services you receive through Central Office.

If your group has stopped contributing (or never started), please bring it up at your next business meeting and take a group conscious. Let us know when and how we can help.

SOME THINGS TO THINK ABOUT WHEN MAKING CONTRIBUTIONS (taken from F-42 Self-Support Card)

Some facts:

- ⇒ Currently about 43.7% of groups contribute to the General Service Office.
- ⇒ Costs of Services provided by G.S.O. (as of 2018) are approximately \$7.40 per member per year.
- ⇒ Gross profit from A.A. literature sales account for over 50% of G.S.O.'s revenue.

SAFETY FOR THE NEWCOMER

We *ALL deserve RESPECT* and the right to get sober in a healthy empowered environment.

Everyone regardless of race, color, gender, age, religion, creed, disability, and sexual orientation, all deserve a chance to get sober without harassment of any kind.

Like one old timer in Hawaii used to say "the good, the bad, and the ugly are in meetings just like on the street."

BE AWARE

Trust is earned.

If someone makes you uncomfortable in any way, tell the secretary and a friend and do not give them your contact information.

A sponsor guides you through the steps and shares their experience as to how they have stayed sober.

FOR PARENTS AND MINORS

Minors should not take rides from members of the opposite sex. There should always be another person with them, with one being of the same sex and age as the minor.

Minors should not go alone to the house of an older sober member to do step work until trustworthiness is established. It is safer to do this work in a public area like a coffee shop.

This literature is part of "Make meetings safer". A grass roots movement in Southern California. Started by a group of concerned group members.
